DIRECTOR STEM OUTREACH

March was a big month for STEM activities.

On March 3rd and 10th we had the privilege of interviewing 28 young ladies for the 2018 Tech Trek Camp Curie. The days were long, but the girls are wonderful, and we'd have liked to send them all. Realistically, we have 8 camper slots and have requested a 9th. Unfortunately, we won't know until mid-May if we get the 9th placement. This gave us the pleasure of notifying our 8 candidates that they were selected and an additional 4 that were alternates for this summer's camp. For that, the Tech Trek committee (Dot Bishop, Charlene Grandfield, Carol Kinnard, Karen Cowan, Jo Ann Houk, Tina Amber, and Sal Tompkins) wants to thank all of you for your ongoing generous donations that allow us to provide these camp scholarships.

Unfortunately, we also had to tell 16 young ladies that they were not chosen. However, due to a new opportunity brought to us with the help of Diane Keller, AAUW-LPD member, we have invited all of the 2017 and 2018 Tech Trek applicants to a March 28th presentation: **Planning for College:** What you need to know in High School. Diane is a former college advisor and we look forward to her addition to our branch STEM support.

We intend to continue looking for and adding STEM activities such as volunteer opportunities at the EYH and STEAM Divas events for former Tech Trekkers and offerings such as our college nights so these young ladies have support and ongoing opportunities in addition to attending Tech Trek Camp.

Following up on last month's article... I received NO FEEDBACK that anyone has any problems with use of evite for branch events, so, at the direction of our board, I have established an email address that will be used to send future evites to you. Please open, (click on "View Message from Host"), review and respond to messages that may come to you from invites@aauw-lpd.org. Sometimes an invitation may include a "poll", usually regarding choices in food. We HAVE NOT established a way for you to automatically pay online, so if payment is needed, that will be noted in the interior of the invitation. The evite for April includes a poll - be sure to complete it- as this is where you make your menu choices.

Because the May meeting will be shortly after the April meeting, the evite for May will come from Sandy Hansen's email address: sandyhansenaauw@gmail.com so we can distribute the invitation at least two weeks before the event. Please watch for it.

Also, please check junk mail settings in your email system and ensure that messages from this address are NOT blocked - or if you don't know how to do that, be sure to check your junk mail or spam to find such items that your system may have filtered.

You DO NOT need to register for an evite account- that would be something to do if you plan to use evite to send invitations. If you did so previously and have no intention to create invitations you can delete the account. Just RESPOND to the messages you'll receive. AAUW NATIONAL PROPOSES CHANGE

About a month ago, AAUW announced that three bylaws amendments are being presented for member consideration. Voting will begin April 25 and close June 9. Each of us will receive a voting "packet" - those w/o an email address will receive a physical packet in the mail; those with email will receive information in an email and it will include a PRIVATE PIN (personal identification number) to vote online. Between April 16 and May 7 you can request a paper ballot - which must be postmarked for return by May 21 (11:59 PM EST).

The amendments are being presented at this time because National AAUW election of officers will be done in 2019 and the nomination process for those positions will begin in the Fall of 2018 - so now is the appropriate time to consider changes. The Fall 2017 issue of AAUW Outlook featured a major article abut the current strategic planning process (reproduced at https://www.aauw.org/2017/12/05/strategic-plan/). All members received it via either snailmail or email. AAUW CEO Kimberley Churches has been on a 'listening tour' of branches, state board meetings and now conventions, listening to member concerns. The National board decided to bring forth these proposals at this time so that changes can proceed in an orderly manner—if approved by the membership. There will be NO convention in 2019 -it has been postponed to 2020. This was in news reported back to the branch after the 2017 convention.

Visit the AAUW website www.aauw.org to read the proposals. Click on "Comment on the Bylaws" to read the actual proposed amendments, their rationale and the many comments that have been made by impassioned members on both sides of each proposal. This will require you to use your member number in the next step. If you do not know it, check with Marilyn Duman or Sandy Hansen - who can look it up for you. Our branch board will devote a part of it's next meeting to a discussion of the proposals. Members are welcome to attend board meetings. Sandy Hansen is President of another AAUW branch - the CA Online Branch - and that branch has just concluded 10 days of discussion of the proposals, including seeking and receiving clarification about the proposals from National staff and leaders. Check with her if you need more information.

What are the proposals?

- 1) A proposal re Article V, Nominations and Elections. There are several sections to this proposal, beginning with terms of the appointed Nominating Committee, continuing with how candidates for elections are proposed; including that the board shall have 12 elected directors one among them being appointed Finance VP and one appointed Secretary (both appointed annually) in addition to the separately elected Chair and Vice Chair, and that the board annually appoint ONE additional person to serve on the board. The final section of this proposal would implement a rotation of board members, so that an entire new board is NOT elected every two years, but so that 1/3 of the board is elected each year, while 2/3 of the board will have the recent "history" of relevant board action. This will begin in 2019 with having 1/3 of candidates stand for 1 year terms, 1/3 for 2 year terms, and 1/3 for 3 year terms. Our own branch bylaws specify that terms should have some overlap to enable such rotation. There are currently 30 comments on this proposal (3/19/2018)
- 2) A proposal re Article VI, Officers and Directors. This would open board membership to non-members. This carries through with the board as proposed in the previous article, but specifies that at least 10 members of the board MUST be AAUW members, and no more than 5 additional board members may be non-AAUW members. There are currently 55 comments on this proposal (3/19/2018)
- 3) A proposal re Article IV. Membership and dues, removing the degree requirement for membership. People are particularly impassioned about this one. Of note in the rationale is that if AAUW seeks funding from outside funders, the current restrictions for membership means that AAUW doesn't meet basic inclusion language required by many funders. Times have changed as AAUW has advocated for equity. Is now the time to make this change? There are currently 147 comments on this proposal (3/19/2018). The proponents of open membership have developed a website at http://openupaauw.org which, besides providing more arguments supporting this proposal, also has a good history of membership requirements in AAUW and how they have changed historically.

AAUW-LPD'S SUPPORT OF TRI-VALLEY EXPANDING YOUR HORIZONS

AAUW-LPD has been a long-standing partner with Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory, Sandia National Laboratories and the Danville-Alamo-Walnut Creek AAUW branch in the annual Tri-Valley Expanding Your Horizons (TVEYH) Conference. The Conference attracts some 300 6th- 9th grade girls annually from the Livermore, Pleasanton, Dublin, San Ramon and Sunol school districts for a fun-filled educational day of hands-on STEM (science, technology, engineering and math) workshops and activities that spark girls' interest in and encourage their pursuit of STEM-related education and career choices. The TVEYH Conference also includes an Adult Program that educates parents on California's public university and college systems and highlights ways to encourage girls in STEM. AAUW members serve as volunteers at the annual TVEYH Conference, primarily as workshop aides. The most recent Conference was held on Saturday, February 24th at Diablo Valley College (DVC) San Ramon Campus.

New this year, thanks to the efforts of LPD members Wendy Ping and Ann Willoughby and with the full support of the Lawrence Livermore and Sandia Conference Co-Chairs, four high-school-aged girls who were Tech Trekkers in middle school had the opportunity to assist at the TVEYH Conference. The engagement of the Tech Trekkers was positively received by Conference leadership and offers opportunities for LPD to continue to nurture Tech Trekkers' interest in STEM, leadership and community service.

Two of the Tech Trekkers who participated in the 2014 summer camp — Colleen McCandless, a junior at Granada High in Livermore, and Emma McNeilly, a junior at Foothill High in Pleasanton — assisted the TVEYH Conference Co-Chairs and the Workshop Co-Chairs in the execution of the event. The two other Tech Trek volunteers, Ki Ja Ourdoune and Samantha Ruelas, participated on a student panel as part of the Adult Program along with three DVC students. All five student panelists are pursuing a STEM-focused education and spoke to parents about what motivated them to pursue STEM and how parents can support their daughters. Highlights from Ki Ja and Samantha's stories as panelists follow.

Ki Ja is a senior at Livermore High School who attended LPD's Tech Trek in 2013. She plans on becoming a civil and environmental engineer. In addressing the parents at TVEYH, Ki Ja spoke passionately about working for Engineers Without Borders after college, helping refugees. She indicated that math and science have always intrigued her and she has participated in STEM programs since middle school. After participating in Tech Trek, she attended the TVEYH Conference in eighth grade, which further sparked her interest in and commitment to STEM.

In high school, Ki Ja has explored hands-on technical work taking a machine tool class as well as a welding class. This past summer she went to Olympia, WA to build a sustainable home dome structure. Ki Ja was one of several Tech Trek volunteers at LPD's STEAM Divas program for fifth grade girls that was piloted in November 2017 at Junction Avenue School. Ki Ja shared that she has taken multiple Honors and AP (Advanced Placement) classes in high school. These more academically rigorous classes have pushed her to expand her horizons.

On a personal note, Ki Ja indicated that her parents and brother are "her rock" and their support has been critical to her success. She stressed the importance of time management and organization skills for students preparing for college, mentioned the importance of overcoming your fears as a growth and life changing opportunity and recommended touring as many colleges as possible.

Samantha is currently a sophomore at Livermore High. She attended Tech Trek in 2015. Her planned college major is bioengineering and she wants to go to medical school. Samantha is a Livermore-Yotsukaido Sister City Organization student representative and participated in the 2017 Camp Cardiac at UC San Francisco. She was an enthusiastic workshop aide for LPD's STEAM Divas program and hopes to be one again next school year.

Samantha indicated that she is the daughter of successful immigrant parents who have encouraged and supported her academic exploration for which she is extremely grateful. Her mom, as a Ph.D. in a STEM field, has been an inspiration. Like Ki Ja, Samantha has participated in high school Honors and AP classes. She encouraged parents to support their children and help them with time management as an important life skill.

LPD is excited to have engaged Tech Trekkers in the TVEYH Conference and would like to thank the following members for their contributions to the 2018 Conference: Wendy Ping, Ann Willoughby, Dot Bishop, Karen Cowan, Carol Kinnard, Charlene Granfield and Susan Wacek.
