These inspiring young women have vision and are passionately focused on using advanced education to directly improve our communities. Andrea Morgan, for example, spoke enthusiastically about using her UC Berkeley graduate study to improve our air and water. She is grateful for the help of a AAUW Career Development Grant funded in part through the Dawn Gordner Grant and our branch. I would also love to hear Emily Pilloton speak! She founded the Girls Garage Young Women's Design and Building Institute to offer creative/ technical skills and career pathways through real-world projects for teenage girls who lack access in their communities. Emily's AAUW Community Action Grant is partially funded by the Pat Mann Grant and by our branch.

Midterm elections brought lively conversation--and some debate-to our branch **referenda discussion**. Attendees are serious about preparing to vote! Part 1: our visit to Pleasanton's Museum on Main to view David Bacon's haunting black/white photos **In the Fields of the North.** This powerful exhibit documents migrant farm workers who follow the harvests from the Mexican border to Washington state and it tells their first-person stories in both English and Spanish. We were keenly aware of the effort that these workers make to provide the fruits and vegetables we ate during our lunch out. Thank you program chairs Sal Tompkins and Maria Kennedy for this event.

Part 2: We learned so much about the complexities of our immigration system through our **speaker Alison Shurtleff Hitz** (senior attorney at Clark Hill specializing in employment-based immigration law--and daughter of branch member Jackie Shurtleff). Alison answered our many questions about legislative and executive actions that continue to shape immigration in our state and country. Thanks to Maria Kennedy for hosting this evening in her home.

Human trafficking is the fastest-growing criminal enterprise in the United States. This dangerous activity is not a faraway problem. It happens in our Tri-Valley neighborhoods, as we learned from a panel of experts at Dublin's **Human Trafficking Town Hall** sponsored by Assemblywoman Catharine Baker. It is sobering but necessary for all of us to recognize signs of human trafficking and to understand what the legislature and local authorities can do to end it in our neighborhoods. This Town Hall prompted follow-up discussion at our monthly **public policy discussion** group.

I attended this month's **Appointments Training** sponsored by **California Women Lead** and Assemblywoman Catharine Baker out of curiosity--and because our branch is a partner to this organization. I knew little about the process that one takes to be appointed to a board/commission/ committee at the local and state level. This training's spirited call to action from Rachel Michelin (CEO, California Women Lead, Gubernatorial Appointee) was infectious. "How many of you have wondered about what it takes to be appointed to a local or state board or commission? Have you clicked on the link to open an online appointments application? Have you filled out that application yet--and why not?!" Mona Pasquil (California Appointments Secretary, Office of Gov. Jerry Brown) said that we women either overthink or think we're not qualified for local and state government leadership roles. Ms. Pasquil claimed that California has the highest proportion of women serving as appointees in the United States and she urges us to step up by checking out this appointment process. Look at the eye-opening <u>State Board/Commission Vacancies</u> list!

Our first Fall **Planning for College** nights offered valuable information in two sessions this month: one for 9th-10th grade girls and a second for 11th-12th grade girls and their families. Branch member Diane Keller presented information from her years of experience as a private practice college advisor to participants who asked a range of questions about college academic and financial requirements and college life in general. Thank you to Diane for sharing your expertise with so many families--and many thanks Tina Amber, Anita Massey, and committee for successfully organizing and implementing these two programs!

Public Policy Interest Group attends Program on Human Trafficking

Members of the Public Policy interest group attended an event held by Assemblywoman Catharine Baker on October 9th at the Shannon Center in Dublin. Ms Baker shared her knowledge of human trafficking . She has teenage children and told us how she is sponsoring bills that bring attention to this subject.

She is partnering with Nancy O'Malley, our Alameda County District Attorney, to bring attention to the problem of Human Trafficking in California and the Tri-Valley. Ms. O'Malley, also serving on our panel, revealed her efforts to carry out current laws that bring human traffickers to justice. She is working on a national level to bring attention to these crimes.

Other panel members included a case manger from the Tri-Valley Haven, a project manager of a group that provides shelter homes for victims and a police officer from Dublin. Highlights of the panel discussion included case studies that looked at the reasons that young girls and boys became victims of traffickers, how they were kept as prisoners, and how some were rescued. The police officer told of how a local woman had alerted him about a suspected ring of traffickers. He expressed hope that we should be vigilant in reporting suspected activity and that we report it to local police. He also asked that we have an ongoing talk with our children about the dangers of human traffickers.

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The donation year will soon be ending. Members of our branch have already separately donated over \$5,000 to the AAUW Fund. Donors to be thanked include Marilyn Barbao, Charlotte Severin, Nancy Cotton, Tina Amber, Pat Mann, Barbara Hempill, Pat Kohnen, Sally Stock, Helen Dourov, Silvia Pereira, Barbara Edwards, Roxann Spilman, Suzanne Emberton, Jaclynn Shurtleff, Harriet Lawrie, Jan Palajac. Most of the group made their donations with their dues payment, but donations can be made at anytime.

Sometimes we receive solicitations from AAUW to support a campaign that might support one of the funds directly - like the Public Policy Fund or a campaign such as the Get Out the Vote Campaign. All of these support the programs that AAUW delivers in support of it's mission. There's also a process to support AAUW in your estate planning documents. Those who do so become part of AAUW's Legacy Circle - and help AAUW have an idea of the funds that might come it's way at some time in the future.

I've heard inquiries - what about establishing a Named Grant which would lead to an endowed fellowship or grant? Our branch initiated the fundraising which supports the Joan Kavanaugh Zehnder International Fellowship, the Patricia Ann Mann Grant and the Dawn Gordner Grant (both can fund Research & Projects OR Community Action OR Career Development Grants). They were established when the AAUW investment portfolio earned a higher rate than it does today.

Because of the current financial climate, it requires \$5,000 initially to begin a Research and Projects Grant, with \$75,000 to be raised in 10 years. To establish an American or International Fellowship requires \$10,000 initially, with \$200,000 to be raised over 15 years. A branch needs to show an established fundraising pattern that can show it will be able to reach it's goal within the specified time frame. This requires a major commitment on behalf of the branch. AAUW CA can often help get other branches to assist in reaching the goal. (Other branches helped complete "our" named grants).

Currently two American Fellowships, one International Fellowship, and four Research and Projects grants established by California branches are incomplete - total need is over \$300,000 to complete the fellowships and grants to the point that their income can begin to fund a scholar or project.

In some cases, fellowships or grants have been established by individuals. When I served on the AAUW CA board, a board member and her sister established an R & P grant honoring their mother. It has taken many years to reach completion and this year it has funded it's first recipient. The fund may well have been helped by their families, branches and other donors. But this is what it takes.

Those who attended learned the process that one should take to be appointed to a board/commission at the local and state level. Most of the state boards and commission are appointed by the Governor, following an application and interview process. No experience is necessary - just a desire to learn and provide the public viewpoint. A list of current openings is available from either Devon or Tina.

Women still represent less than 30% of elected and appointed seats at the county, state and federal level. California Women Lead has a mission: To promote dynamic, ethical, diverse women leaders running for local and state offices with a far-reaching effect on issues that affect all Californians.

AAUW California 2018 Legislative Year Update

If you've been tracking AAUW California legislation in the last few years, you'll note the number of bills related to closing the gender pay gap. We've made tremendous headway since 2015 working with the Stronger California coalition. The Fair Pay Act has been improved (<u>SB 358–</u>2015, <u>SB 1063</u> - 2016) and California now limits the use of one's prior salary to establish a new salary. Just this year, an additional refinement was made (<u>AB 2282</u> – Eggman) so there is no doubt, an employer cannot inquire or use one's prior salary. There are still <u>other areas to be</u> <u>addressed</u>, including pay data transparency so that employers and the public can better understand a company's pay practices. Unfortunately our cosponsored bill on this issue (<u>SB 1284</u>–Jackson) was stalled in the legislative process this year.

Momentum on the equal pay bills was assisted by the #MeToo movement and awareness that sexual harassment is fueled by disproportionate power dynamics, as is the gender pay gap. Many bills made it to the Governor's desk, with <u>mixed results</u>. Most importantly, Governor Brown signed <u>SB 1300</u> (Jackson), a bill addressing discrimination and harassment in the work-place - also known as the "no free grope" bill.

Our work is not done. To quote a former Governor, "we'll be back," to work with the new Governor to accomplish all that needs to be done to make California a bastion of equity and fairness for women.
