## Volunteers Needed Tri-Valley Expanding Your Horizons STEM Conference for 6<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> Grade Girls Saturday, February 23, 2019

AAUW is a partner in the annual Tri-Valley Expanding Your Horizons (TVEYH) conference sponsored by Lawrence Livermore and Sandia National Laboratories. Both the LPD and Danville-Alamo-Walnut Creek branches have been long-time supporters of the TVEYH conference, which serves some 300 local 6<sup>th</sup>-9<sup>th</sup> grade girls annually. The 2019 TVEYH conference is scheduled for Saturday, February 23, 2019, from 9:00 AM to 3:00 PM, at Diablo Valley College San Ramon Campus.

The TVEYH conference consists of multiple hands-on STEM workshops, a career fair, special engineering activity for the girls and an adult program to provide guidance for parents on STEM educational tracks & college admissions. Girls participating in the conference meet a wide variety of female role models in different STEM fields and learn that STEM education and career options are interesting and accessible to them. Girls are encouraged to take classes that prepare them for rewarding and well-paying STEM jobs.



AAUW volunteers serve as workshop monitors, checking girls in at the start of the workshop and assisting workshop leaders to distribute materials and keep an eye on the girls. No STEM experience is required. There are two volunteer sessions available: 8:30 AM to 11:00 AM and 12:00 Noon to 2:30 PM. Light refreshments are provided for volunteers.

The IBC (Alameda County Interbranch Council) delegates met for their bi-monthly meeting on Tuesday, January 15. There was considerable discussion of communications issues the branches are facing, specifically related to getting members to read their newsletters. Most branches distribute their newsletters using Mailchimp (what we use) or a similar service. Most have about a 50% "open" rate - which is good for a non-profit newsletter - though disturbing in terms of reaching our members. (More on that in the Communications article on Page 9)

A couple of IBC members have been in contact with National staff regarding the Work Smart salary negotiation initiative that is supported by the AAUW Fund. In partnership with Morgan Stanley, workshop sessions have begun to be held in San Francisco. There is an effort to bring these workshops to the East Bay. Why is negotiation so important? AAUW's research on the gender pay gap shows that, <u>one year out of college</u>, women are already paid significantly less than men. Women who work full time take home <u>80 cents</u> for every dollar a full-time male worker is paid. And over a lifetime, those lost potential earnings add up.

We were advised that Work Smart is a HIGH PRIORITY initiative with AAUW and a FREE online salary negotiation skill-builder is available at: <u>http://www.salary.aauw.org</u>. AAUW has received a matching grant from Coca Cola to support this program. Each of us can be part of the Work Smart initiative by accessing the skill-builder, see how it works, then sharing information about it with our family and friends so that 10 million women can be trained by 2020! Please check it out and share it!

In addition, there was discussion of the January 19 Women's marches and of activities that the various branches will be doing for Equal ay Day in April. Sandy

Thanks to Tina for handling Evites for our January event at the Karlsen's.home. About half the members of the branch responded to the Evite. Did you open your message? They're very easy to respond to and give us an idea of how many to expect for our events - whether it is chairs and or tables to be prepared, wine glasses or coffee cups to provide, etc. Please let Tina or me know if you have problems with these invitations.

We're also learning that about half of our members are opening the "Weekly Updates" and opened the email with the January *Grapevine*. Perhaps these are the members who are most interested in branch activities and possibly able to participate. Only five of our members lack email, so we hope that all of you know how to open messages, click on links, etc. We can access our email on so many devices that it's difficult to provide instructions generic for all in a *Grapevine* article.

Three members reported problems with either opening or printing the January *Grapevine*, as distributed with our new Mailchimp system. Be sure that your email carrier is set to receive messages from "<u>aauwlpdbranch@gmail.com</u>" as that is the new "sending" account.

There will be a link in the message you receive which will go to the *Grapevine* which is actually a file that has been uploaded to our website as a .pdf file. Click on the link and the *Grapevine* should open on your device. It may take a while to load to your device (some are slower than others). If you want to print it, you must "download" it to your device, and then you must "send" it to a printer on your network. Please let me know if you continue to have problems.

I'd be happy to visit any interest group and have a brief hands-on session to help you with any difficulties. Communication is two-way - we send - you receive - and you can send to us. All branch leaders are e-mail competent. We expect that you are receiving messages since our system tells us when you don't receive what has been sent. These are "bounces" and no messages are "bouncing". Note - the link to the *Grapevine* that you receive in email is different than the version that is publicly available on the website - but you can always find a version (lacking contact detail) on the branch website at <u>https://lpd-ca.aauw.net/grapevine-newsletter/</u>. You may have noticed that most of the communications from our AAUW branch, including the newsletter, are now being delivered to you via Mailchimp. Just want you to know that Mailchimp is a delivery vehicle. Almost all other AAUW branches

have adopted its use as a good practice. All formatting is exactly the same. If you have any questions or concerns about this change, please ask me.

We want to continue to strongly encourage our members to use email for branch communications. I know that some of you prefer to have a printed copy of the newsletter, but as good environmental stewards, we should be limiting unnecessary printing.

When you receive your copy of the newsletter, read it and note on your calendars the events that you plan to attend. If you need to refer back to the newsletter you can return to the email.

I would encourage you to set up folders within your email account if you have not already done so. It's easy then to file the email in the folder and it will be accessible if you need to re-read the newsletter.
