Progress toward gender equality appears to be the latest in a long list of casualties of the coronavirus pandemic.

We already know what a 9/2020 New York Times article details:

Improvements in gender equality in the workplace may be another casualty of the coronavirus, as women find their place in the workforce more at risk.

Substantial research has shown that most professional gender gaps <u>are in fact motherhood gaps</u>: women without children are much closer to parity with men when it comes to salaries and promotions, however, mothers pay a large career penalty.

The **AAUW vision** (fair pay and educational and economic opportunity for women) continues for us until we end our stay-at-home status. What can you do this month to further this vision?

## **Report from October AAUW Fund Virtual Luncheons**

In normal times, AAUW members gather on three dates to attend luncheons in Northern and Southern California to hear short presentations from the recipients of grants and fellowships who are in California. Now we are not in "normal" times, so two events were held in October, each with 10 or so speakers. The presentations were all recorded and videos are available at the AAUW-CA website at <u>https://www.aauw-ca.org/aauw-fund-luncheons/</u>. Each presentation runs about 10 minutes.

As you probably know, I now live at a senior residence. I participate in a "current events" weekly discussion group at my residence, led by an instructor at a local community college and recently discussion included the systemic difficulties in reaching and helping low income students of color to succeed in college. Immediately I thought of **Constance IIoh**, the fellow supported by the **Anne Les American Fellowship** (among others). Being able to watch – and stop the video and read the slides of her presentation is help-ful. Her final slide links to her website at <u>www.constanceiloh.com</u>. Her research can lead to colleges doing more to support the students who have many life challenges, among them being persons of color who are parenting, struggling financially and can often feel blocked by "the system". So many students today have very different life experiences than our cohorts when we were students. One can also get the feeling that AAUW is supporting important society-changing research. Her segment begins at about 36:30 on the Oct. 24 video.

**Claire Breining** is pursuing a second career as a nurse/practitioner/midwife, focusing on providing services to underserved racial groups. The U.S. makes little use of midwives who can provide maternity services to women of color. Claire is from the Midwest and completed high school and started college in Argentina. She completed college in Wisconsin, where she became interested in immigration issues related to Spanish-speaking women and children, which moved her to work as an immigration paralegal following college. She eventually left the paralegal field and for four years was a project manager at a tech start-up. While working in tech her immigration/advocacy "basis" found her becoming a volunteer birth doula, which has now inspired her to pursue the formal training for a career change to gain an M.S. as a Nurse Practitioner at UCSF, specializing in midwifery. Her presentation includes slides which detail the racial disparities in maternity services for women of color, especially for black women. She hopes to work as a Nurse/ practitioner/midwife in a public hospital in California, with the eventual goal of opening her own non-profit stand-alone birthing center in an area that currently doesn't offer this option to birthing families. She's supported by 25 AAUW endowments, including the Livermore-Pleasanton-Dublin Branch/Dawn Gordner Grant. Her presentation begins at 1:33:45 on the video.

**Denise Mitchell** is a teacher at Martin Luther King Jr. High School in Riverside, pursuing an M.S. in Botany & Plant Sciences at UC Riverside. She's an inspirational experienced teacher, who, 30 years after graduating from Riverside, is now returning to receive her M.S. She is committed to inspiring her students to pursue STEM careers and to have a sense of reverence for our planet. Her research presentation is rather technical, involving tracking various plants indigenous to the desert areas near Riverside and studying how they manage to survive hot, dry conditions. If you're interested in gardening and ecology you can focus on her research explanation. Denise is supported by 25 endowments, including the **Livermore-Pleasanton-Dublin Branch/Patricia Ann Mann Grant**. Her presentation is the final one on the video, beginning at 1:54:18.



#### STANDING RULES AMENDMENT

In the next few weeks all members with e-mail will receive an email using SurveyMonkey seeking your approval of these proposals. Others will receive a printed ballot in regular mail.

Our branch has Bylaws, Policies & Procedures, and Standing Rules. The Standing Rules appear annually in the branch directory that all members receive. These Standing Rules relate to branch activities, affect all members and can be amended only by a vote of all members. Our board has reviewed our Standing Rules and seeks approval by the branch of two amendments. One affects Programs/Activities of the branch, the other affects members.

1) Insert as #2 under Program and renumber the following sections: "Branch meetings are covered under our insurance policy through AAUW California. In accord with this coverage, we take the guidance of AAUW California regarding having in-person meetings of any size. As a branch, we adhere to this guidance."

2) Add as #3 under Membership: "As a national grassroots organization dedicated to improving the lives of women and their families, members are encouraged to participate in the programs and activities of the branch. "

**Reasoning:** The addition under Program needs to be added to ensure that membership understands the reason that in-person meetings may be limited. Generic language is used to avoid calling out the specific crisis we are enduring and make it hold in the event of any future circumstance. This is urgent and needs to be done now.

The addition under Membership is being added now because it is convenient to go to the members with a vote as rarely as possible. This addition is being made to help members understand that a commitment to the branch beyond the payment of dues is encouraged. Participation includes support of the various AAUW fundraising programs.

Thanks for your cooperation as these changes are made.



## LEGAL ADVOCACY FUND

#### challenging sex discrimination in higher education and the workplace

<u>AAUW's Legal Advocacy Fund</u> recently streamlined the application and grant-making system to better support plaintiffs facing sex discrimination in employment or education. They also launched Clinic Campus Outreach Grants, which are available to law school clinical programs in California and New York that address legal claims regarding gender equity.


