#### BOARD BRIEFS from 9/01/21 meeting

- Board will try alternating between Zoom and in-person board meetings month by month.
- Discussed proposed 2021-22 <u>branch budget</u>. Talked about ways to increase both savings and income. Proposed creation of a branch fundraising committee.
- <u>Girl Program Planning</u>: made further plans for 10/2021 *Planning for College* and *Career Speaker Series* nights. Karen Cowan and Nitu Shinde volunteered to train with Tech Trek chair Anita Massey this year and co-lead Tech Trek committee next year. Anita then plans to continue to co-lead Program Planning.
- <u>AAUW Funds</u>: Our branch financially assisted 7 people who received grants or fellowships. PJ Wells thinks that individuals who benefited from AAUW Funds might be *Career Speaker Series* candidates.
- <u>State Committee Meeting Report</u> (Anita Massey): Marketing and Membership. Working to raise visibility of California AAUW across the state and to use media to best advantage. Found young women have <u>3 key interest areas</u>: advancing careers, networking, enhancing leadership. Found young women do not relate to/like the term 'Political Advocacy', but do like topics that are covered by it.

#### Alameda CO AAUW Inter-Branch Council (IBC) BRIEFS from 9/21 meeting

- Representatives from 6 IBC branches attend meetings (Fremont, Alameda, Hayward/Castro Valley, Berkeley, Oakland/Piedmont, Livermore/Pleasanton/Dublin). Members agreed that <u>one vote/branch</u> is appropriate on any issue, since some branches have more than one representative at each meeting.
- <u>AAUW name</u> can only be used for branch bank accounts (not IBC's bank account) because IBC is not a
  recognized AAUW organization. IBC money has to reside in a branch account if IBC keeps an account
  (per AAUW national bylaws). Motion discussed/passed: Close Alameda CO IBC bank account, refund
  money to each branch as appropriate for their contributions, and then close the account.
- Members agreed to inform their branch members about a 9/29 AAUW Zoom training class on redistricting and Community of Interest (COI) mapping. Alameda County and other organizations must evaluate redistricting as a result of the 2020 Census. Motion passed: IBC members will present a sample redistricting resolution to their branch board for proposed adoption.
- Discussion topics and branch reports: ways each branch will involve new or prospective members this Fall, ideas for co-hosting branch events with IBC branches or other community organizations, how is each branch disseminating newsletters

Update: On April 15, 2021, the House of Representatives voted 217-210 to pass the Paycheck Fairness Act with bipartisan support. However, on June 8, 2021 it failed on a party-line procedural vote in the Senate, 49-50.

The fight is not over. Your Senator still needs to hear from you. Call on your elected officials to listen to voters (who overwhelmingly support pay equity) and work to pass this important bill.



# Help Fight for Paid Leave

Over half of mothers who left their jobs during the pandemic reportedly did so because their child's school or daycare closed. Many women cannot return to

the workforce without access to child care and paid leave. This is unacceptable!

Congress is working toward their final budget resolution. Tell them it's time to catch up with developed countries that provide meaningful paid leave and childcare to workers. Take action now (10 minutes).

# Lou Henry Hoover

First Lady of the United States (1929-33). First woman to receive a geology degree from Stanford University. Co-founder and President of the Girl Scouts of America.



# Mae Jemison

First Black woman to travel in space. Engineer, physician and NASA astronaut. Received 2007 Achievement Award.



#### Margaret Mead

First woman president of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, Curator Emeritus of the American Museum of Natural History. Pioneering anthropologist and activist. Received 1978 AAUW

Achievement Award.

#### **Chien-Shiung Wu**

First woman President of the American Physical Society and physics pioneer. First woman to receive an honorary degree from Princeton and first woman to receive the National Academy of Sciences' Comstock Prize. Wu's

work was termed the most important development in the field of atomic and nuclear physics to date in 1959; her male co-workers Lee and Yang received the Nobel Prize, but her work was overlooked.

Funding Women's History AAUW has a proud heritage of helping women pursue higher education, tracing back to 1881--when few women had that opportunity. Click the link to read about our first fellows, our support of a 1920's STEM pioneer, our WWII War Relief Fund, the 1963 African Educators' Program, and 1970's-era grants to bring more women into non-traditional fields such as law, business and medicine.



First woman to win an unshared Nobel Prize in physiology or medicine for her study of genetic transposition or "jumping genes" in maize. Received 1947 AAUW Achievement Award: \$2,500 prize, at a time when 95% of

available funding was going to men.
