#### **AAUW LPD Afternoon Book Group comment**



#### America Calling: A Foreign Student in a Country of Possibility

This book by 1995-96 AAUW International Fellow Rajika Bhandari is a both deeply personal story of one immigrant's search for her place and voice, and an incisive analysis of America's relationship with the rest of the world through a powerful tool of diplomacy: education.

AAUW began an experimental study center in 1963 for 7th and 8th grade Junction Avenue School so that they have a quiet place to do their homework.

Margory Bunyard AAUW LPD Branch President 1962-64



The highlight of my tenure as president for the LPD AAUW Branch was doing our accuracy in news media study; creating observer corps to attend City Council and Planning Commission Meetings in Livermore and Pleasanton and checking the accuracy of coverage of the three newspapers (The *Herald, Times* and *Independent*) afterward. We received national recognition for this, and then successfully lobbied for a national study topic Media Issues in Communication. We were then appointed to serve as the California State Chair for that topic for two years, with branches all over California and the US doing meaningful studies: *The Images of Women in the Media, The Effect of Violence in the Media on Children*, etc.

Charlotte Severin AAUW LPD Branch President 1972-74

I was president during a very exciting time. We were in the midst of the Women's Movement, and it kept our branch very busy. We worked hard to pass the Equal Rights Amendment, and although it failed, it did raise the awareness of the country to the fact that women were not being given equal treatment. We wore pins that said 59 cents, since that's what women earned in comparison to men doing similar work. Title IX helped women athletes in our schools.

Dawn Gordner AAUW LPD Branch President 1974-75

Our branch responded to a perceived community need by compiling a Pre-School Directory. Members visited every preschool in the Tri-Valley Area and completed a questionnaire for each. Although the pre-schools were not evaluated, the directory included guidelines to help parents in assessing where to send their children.

Barbara Hempill AAUW LPD Branch President 1987-88

The Association Convention for 1989 was held in Washington, D.C. Sandy Hansen was incoming president, and Barbara Hempill and I were immediate past presidents. We stayed at the Sheraton Washington Hotel, which stair-steps uphill a couple blocks from the subway. The schedule was packed with briefings, caucuses, business meetings, and even an address by President George Bush.

Robin Morgan AAUW LPD Branch President 1987-88

A highlight of my term as branch president was that I was thrilled to have recruited a full board well in advance of the beginning of my term, so that all positions were filled and our branch had good attendance at district leadership events that prepared them for their responsibilities.

Following my Presidency, I became involved at the state level (state Director of Public Policy Committee, state Secretary, working to maintain and upgrade our state website).

#### **AAUW Legislative Updates**

(from AAUW California Public Policy Committee Co-Chair Kathi Harper)



In mid-October, Governor Newsom acted on AAUW CA priority bills awaiting his signature. Here are the results:

SB 62	requires fair pay, instead of "by the piece" payment, for garment
	workers
AB 367	free menstrual products must be provided in girls/women's
	bathrooms in schools
AB 887	allows domestic violence restraining orders to be filed electronically
AB 123	increases paid family leave benefits to 65 –75% of regular pay
AB 1074	requires hotel and janitorial workers who have lost their jobs due the
	pandemic to be prioritized for hiring as businesses reopen
	AB 367 AB 887

#### The Vote and Reproductive Rights

(information from AAUW Action Fund Washington Update)

This year, a historic number of restrictive laws were enacted or proposed in two key issue areas: voting and reproductive rights.

What are "anti-voter bills"? What are "anti-abortion bills"? What's the connection?

**AAUW message:** Congress must act to protect our constitutional rights in every state.

## How does AAUW set **Public Policy Priorities**?

- In the fall of even-numbered years the **AAUW Public Policy Committee (APPC)** solicits feedback from AAUW members and staff to develop proposed Public Policy Priorities.
- The proposed draft is posted online for a comment period and submission of additional proposed revisions.
- A final draft is reviewed by the AAUW Board of Directors, amended as necessary, and approved.
- Finally, AAUW members vote on these proposed Public Policy Priorities in the spring of odd-numbered years.
- The adopted Public Policy Priorities guide the federal action issues on which AAUW members across
  the country focus their advocacy efforts and guide the work of the national staff.

#### Where We Stand

- AAUW's policy work connects and rallies advocates at the local, state, national, and global levels to empower women and girls.
- AAUW uses lobbying and grassroots efforts to push forward policies that break through educational and economic barriers for women.
- We support strong laws to close the wage gap, provide paid sick time and parental leave, protect pregnant workers, curtail sexual harassment and more.
