You're invited to Choose Your Own Adventure to:



Do you know....how our AAUW branch has responded to the needs of women both locally and much further geographically? Here are more **reflections from a few AAUW LPD past presidents** (years 1990-2000).

I remember Margaretta Lovell, Associate Professor of Art history at UC Berkeley. She was a Legal Advocacy Fund (LAF) grant receiver in her fight against the glass ceiling at the University. I was appalled at what she had had to go through. This led to my consistent support of LAF.

Pat Mann AAUW LPD Branch President 1992-93

As president of our branch, I had the great opportunity to pick up skills that I use in all aspects of my life. AAUW has been one of the first calls I make whenever I move into a new community.

One of the more impressive things I remember our branch doing is participating in the voter education campaign. It was so impressive to see a room full of women mailing flyers, making phone calls, etc.

I remember the AAUW State Convention in San Jose and shining as a five-star branch; a year of fabulous newsletters (thank you, Marie Bledsoe); learning the obstacles girls face and, in true AAUW form, learning how to beat those obstacles.

Philomena Rambo AAUW LPD Branch President 1994-1995

My mom, Marti Silva, is a long-time AAUW LPD member, so I grew up with AAUW in the background. My first AAUW activity was joining the Moms and Tots group and babysitting coop.....and that initial involvement led to participation in other interest groups; a book club, investment club, and wine education group. Being a volunteer host on the branch's 30-minute community television show *Byline AAUW* (interviews with community members about educational and women's issues) led to my current position as producer and host of *Fully Informed* at the same television station.

Carolyn Siegfried AAUW LPD Branch President 1995-1996

The year I was president-elect was one of sheer panic because I didn't own a computer, have an email address, nor had I ever "surfed the net". Instead of concentrating on learning how to be president, I learned the skills to bring myself into the computer age. For that, thank you AAUW!

"Picture an invisible weightless knapsack.

Inside my knapsack are assets I can count on...special provisions, maps, passports, codebooks, visas, clothes, tools. I know I can use these assets daily, but I'm usually oblivious to these assets."

Peggy McIntosh, feminist author of the 1989 classic paper *White Privilege: Unpacking the Invisible Knapsack*, collected observations during her teaching career. She was surprised to note at least 50 hidden benefits of the privilege white people experience in everyday life. "I repeatedly forgot each of the realizations on

this list until I wrote them down. For me, white privilege has turned out to be an elusive and fugitive subject." McIntosh noted crossovers between this list of white privilege and male privilege.


Examples from the *Invisible Backpack* essay:

- I can go shopping alone most of the time, pretty well assured that I will not be followed or harassed.
- I can turn on the television or open to the front page of the paper and see people of my race widely represented.
- I can go into a music shop and count on finding music of my race represented, into a supermarket and find staple foods that fit my cultural traditions, into a hairdresser and find someone who can cut my hair.
- Whether I use checks, credit cards or cash, I can count on my skin color not to work against the appearance of financial reliability.
- I can swear, or dress in secondhand clothes, or not answer letters, without having people attribute these choices to the bad morals, the poverty, or the illiteracy of my race.
- I can speak in public to a powerful male group without putting my race on trial.
- If I should need to move, I can be pretty sure of renting or purchasing housing in an area which I can afford and in which I would want to live.
- I am never asked to speak for all the people of my racial group.
- I can be pretty sure that if I ask to talk to "the person in charge," I will be facing a person of my race.
- If a traffic cop pulls me over or if the IRS audits my tax return, I can be sure I haven't been singled out because of my race.
- I can take a job with an affirmative action employer without having co-workers on the job suspect that I got it because of race.
- I can be sure that if I need legal or medical help, my race will not work against me.
- When I am told about our national heritage or about "civilization," I am shown that people of my color made it what it is.

Peggy Macintosh founded the <u>National SEED Project</u> to confirm her belief that teachers could be leaders of their own professional development.

The Family Roe: An American Story by Joshua Prager

In his third book, Prager tells the stories of the overlooked women behind the 1973 Supreme Court decision. Using interviews, letters, and personal papers, Prager tells the Roe story through the life of Norma McCorvey (whose unwanted pregnancy gave way to the Supreme Court case), Linda Coffee (lawyer who filed the original lawsuit), Curtis Boyd (fundamentalist Christian turned abortion provider), and Mildred Jefferson (first Black woman to graduate from Harvard Medical School).
