Grapevine 6/2022: Olivina Tasting and Tour



Twenty of us had a beautiful afternoon on May 21 at the Olivina

Estate in Livermore. Fourth generation Estate owner, Charles Crohare shared the history of the site, along with how he and his father transitioned from cattle ranching to the olive oil business. Today the Estate has nearly 11,000 trees, including

some that have been on the property since it was established in 1881.







We tasted six oils and two vinegars during our visit. Charles walked us through his state-of-the-art Italian olive mill which processes over 300 tons of olives every year! We all have a new appreciation for true California Extra Virgin Olive Oil. If you missed the tour and would like to taste or buy the

products, you can visit the Olivina booth at the Pleasanton Farmers Market on Saturdays, or visit the Estate on the 3rd Sunday of every month from noon to 4:30.

Tech Trek is Back

First, thank you to all of our branch members whose contributions make this camp possible. After 2 years of pandemic challenges we are back and sending **12 girls** to camp.

Our home camp, Stanford, was not able to host us this year, so we were uncertain of what space we would have. Happily, the other Northern California branches and camps stepped up and we have 2 girls going to Fresno, 6 girls going to Davis and 4 girls attending a virtual Tech Trek. This worked out well as some parents still are not comfortable having their daughters attend a residential camp.

As you know, 100% of your donations go directly to the cost of having girls attend camp (currently \$1000 for residential and \$400 for virtual). Additionally, we ask the families, if they are able, to contribute \$50. We use their donations to run our program, including a gift bag for each girl attending camp and camp orientation when possible.



This year, PJ Wells and Anita Massey went shopping, and with great bargain hunting and a fantastic donation of pop-its from Nitu Shinde built the gift bags pictured here. These were delivered to each girl in mid-May so she would have them before camp. As we put camp year 2022 to rest, we are ready to begin fundraising for 2023 as well as transitioning the committee leadership. While Anita



will continue on the committee, leadership will transition to Nitu Shinde and Karen Cowen. I know you will continue to support them and this great program moving forward.

Membership Update

Thank you for your patience this year as we work through membership renewals for the 2022-2023 year.

AAUW is developing a new membership system that will provide many benefits, but it is new and there are quite a few changes. You should have all received a May 9 email

from me with directions on how to access The Community Hub.

This year you will pay dues directly on the Community Hub site with a credit card. I hope that you will try to pay dues online, as this is AAUW's system of the future.

Paying dues online now involves the following steps:

- Login to <u>AAUW.org</u>. Click on "Log In" in the upper right-hand corner of the screen.
 - If this is the first time you are logging into the new Community Hub Membership System, you will need to reset your passcode. Click on the "forgot passcode" link to set your new passcode. Once you have your new passcode, log in.
- Review your contact information.
- Click on the big blue button at the bottom to renew your membership.
- You will be asked to verify your college degree and year.
- You will have the choice to renew as a lifetime member or a regular national member
- Click on CA0048 to renew your membership to the Livermore Pleasanton Dublin Branch.
- Click on CA to renew your state dues.
- You will have the option to donate to the Greatest Needs Fund.
- Pay with your credit card.

For most members, annual dues will be \$103 (\$67 national, \$20 state and \$16 branch).

Of course, a check may be sent to our PO Box or to me directly and I will update the Hub for you.

AAUW Fund

AAUW's fellowships and grants are supported by endowed funds – only the interest from the principal in each fund is distributed annually to support scholars, research, and community grants. The endowments are named to honor AAUW members. Four of our branch members have been so honored.



AAUW CA is proud that California members contributed \$494,020 to AAUW

Fund to continue working toward our mission. The funds that our branch raised during the fiscal year (in 2021 it was \$5,050.00) are pooled with funds from other chapters and managed at the national level.

A committee at the national level then selects the fund recipients. Recipients fall into one of two categories: 1) "Fellows" for those in Ph.D programs

2) "Grants" for those pursuing a specific project or an additional professional degree.

Donations for "Scholarships" benefit undergraduate recipients and are not part of the AAUW Fund. They fall into a different donation vehicle.

If, like me, you are curious about the fine women benefiting from the AAUW Fund this year, let me share a profile for each of the four recipients over the next couple of newsletters. This month <u>Zofia Wlodarczyk</u> could not be more relevant, based upon the war information coming from the Ukraine, Poland and European nations.

In her research, Zofia Wlodarczyk focuses on issues of migration, gender and human rights, specifically on the experiences of female refugees fleeing domestic violence. Previously her work focused on the agency of rural women in Poland and Polish feminists. Her goal is to advocate for women's and refugees' rights through her work in the public and third sectors.
