<u>CalMatters 2022 Voter's Guide</u> (non-partisan, non-profit) can help you to make your voting plan for November: check your registration, confirm your polling place, see what measures are coming up for a vote in your district, and more.

This November, all the seats in the House of Representatives and 1/3 of the Senate will be up for **re-election**. November 2022 is the first election cycle affected by the 2020 census and the recent flood of anti-voter laws.

Since the beginning of 2021,18 states have passed 34 restrictive voting laws.

- SB 523 expands health plans' contraceptive coverage
- SB 1375 allows nurse practitioners to practice under standard protocols to provide first-trimester abortion care

#### The Complicated Truth about the Pay Gap

As the name of AAUW's seminal report implies, the existence of the gender pay gap is a simple truth. But when it comes to capturing complete data from a rapidly changing labor market...let's just say it's complicated. Fortunately, our annual update to <u>The Simple Truth about the Gender Pay Gap</u> will provide context and analysis to help you make sense of the latest information from the U.S. Census Bureau. <u>Look for it on our website within the next few weeks.</u>



**From AAUW national CEO Gloria Blackwell:** "...During the pandemic, millions of women were forced out of the workforce due to layoffs and caregiving demands. We knew AAUW's typical method of calculating the gender pay gap—by assessing only full-time, year-round workers—wouldn't tell the whole story.

This year, we compared all wage earners, *including* part-time and seasonal workers. When we used this analysis on the <u>data released in mid-September by the U.S. Census</u>

**Bureau**, women were paid barely three-quarters—just 77%—of what men earned in 2021.

And the pay gaps for Black women (64%) and Latinas (54%) were beyond egregious when compared to white, non-Hispanic men. Even the traditional calculation showed the overall pay gap had, at best, stagnated. Learn more and take action. There can be no gender equity without racial equity."

AAUW is calling on the 117th Congress to ensure that a **permanent paid leave program, childcare funding and the Child Tax Credit** are included in the budget reconciliation process.

Federal lawmakers Lawmakers are expected to vote on a 12-week budget extension by the end of the week in order to avoid a partial government shutdown that would begin on Oct. 1. The full year funding plan for fiscal 2023 is still unfinished, and serious negotiations on that plan likely won't take place until after the election. ## We have come a long way! Did you know that....

The **Association of Collegiate Alumnae** or ACA, (AAUW's predecessor organization) was officially founded in1882 to organize women college graduates who could help women to find greater opportunities to use their education, as well as promoting and assisting other women's college attendance. The ACA hoped to improve standards of education for women so that men and women's higher education was more equal in scope and difficulty.<sup>[5]</sup>

In 1885, the organization took on <u>one of its first major projects</u>: they essentially had to justify their right to exist. A common belief held at the time that a college education would harm a woman's health and result in infertility. This myth was supported by Harvard-educated Boston physician Dr. Edward H. Clarke.<sup>[5]</sup>

An ACA committee led by Annie Howes created a series of questions that were sent to 1,290 ACA members; 705 replies were received. After the results were tabulated, <u>the data demonstrated that higher education did</u> <u>not harm women's health</u>. The report, "Health Statistics of Female College Graduates", was published in 1885 in conjunction with the Massachusetts Bureau of Statistics of Labor. This first research report is one of many conducted by AAUW during its history.<sup>[6]</sup>
