

#### **Branch CA Ballot Proposition Discussion: Take-Aways....**

AAUW-LPD members like to hear what fellow members are talking about—whether at a book group, coffee, or other get-together. AAUW members talk about what affects us locally and nationally—and of course the November 8 election is foremost for us this Fall!

The 10/20 Coffee and... **Special Ballot Proposition Discussion** focused on upcoming ballot propositions. Feedback from **Chris Alesso** and **Roz Gamble** follow. Click **HERE** to access the October *Grapevine* (page 7) for several sources to consider.

**(Chris)** We talked the most about Proposition I, the school bond issue in Pleasanton. Roz had been to another meeting and gave us a lot of background. We learned that the last bond issue for a new school was dedicated to building a new school. Pleasanton's population does not now support a new school, but the money cannot be used for things like repairs to current schools. Hence the need for a new initiative.

We also discussed the likelihood that sports betting will keep appearing on our ballot until it passes in some way, so maybe we should consider Proposition 26 in this light.

Those of us at this discussion like funding for arts programs but dislike the funding mechanism.

As always, we left to go home and make up our own minds.

(Roz) I attended a meeting about this November 8th's Pleasanton school bond. If passed, this bond will increase property tax by \$49 per \$100,00 of assessed value. Bond monies can only be used for facilities. Pleasanton has one of the lowest bond tax rates in the East Bay. Here are my meeting take-aways:

Monies from the 2016 bond election to build a new elementary school were set aside due to changes in the school population. This year's bond will support continued repairs to deteriorating plumbing, roofs, outdated electrical wiring, HVAC and ADH access in our schools. Many school buildings are 70-90 years old. There will be new centers at Village High School. Also supported will be the new visual and performing arts centers at Foothill and Amador Valley High School. New gyms and locker rooms are needed at Amador Valley High School. The Amador facility cannot currently be used by the students due to safety issues.

**Heather Boushey**, a member of President Biden's Council of Economic Advisers and co-founder of the Washington Center for Equitable Growth. This 1997–98 AAUW American Fellow's groundbreaking research showed that equity fuels healthy economies.



### 2021-22 California Legislative Session Closes with Big Wins for AAUW California

(thanks to branch Public Policy chair Chris Alesso for noting this synopsis from Kathi Harper, Chair, AAUW California Public Policy Committee)

**Midnight 9/30/2022**: Governor Newsom's deadline to sign or veto 2021-22 legislative session bills.

The AAUW California Public Policy committee is pleased to announce a 70% success rate on the bills on our legislative agenda: 25 of our 36 bills are now law, including 7 of our 8 top priority bills.

#### **Economic Security for All Women**

8 of our bills were signed by the Governor, 1 was vetoed, and 1 died in the legislature. The most significant bill under this pillar was **AB** (**Assembly Bill**) **92**, which we co-sponsored. AB 92 was introduced in 2020, and became a 2-year bill, which is why it remained on this year's agenda. This bill originally sought a 1-year waiver of supplemental child-care fees for low-income families, with a request for a sliding scale to be applied thereafter. In his 2021 budget, Governor Newsom included \$120 million for 2 years' worth of waivers. The bill was then amended to request an additional year of waivers through October 2024, with a sliding scale to then be implemented. Unfortunately, the amended bill was vetoed; however, we are still proud of the work we did to get those 2 years of waivers in the budget, so we still consider it a win!

#### **Equal Access to Quality Public Education for All Students**

6 of these bills were signed by the Governor, 1 was vetoed, 1 was approved by the legislature (no signature required) and 2 died in the legislature. Of particular note under this pillar are 3 of our top priority bills:

AB 1968, which requires campuses to develop and post uniform guidelines for reporting sexual assault

AB 2881, which provides additional support for college students with dependent children

**AJR 23** (Assembly Joint Resolution), a Title IX 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Proclamation

#### Social and Racial Justice for All Members of Society

8 of these bills were signed by the Governor, 1 was vetoed, 1 was incorporated by the Governor into an Executive Order, 1 was approved, and 2 died in the legislature. We saw success on all 4 of our top priority bills in this area:

**AB 1666**, which provides protection for those from other states seeking abortions in California, as well as for those providing services here, from the enforcement of a related civil judgment from their home state

SB (Senate Bill) 523, which requires insurance coverage for over-the-counter contraceptive products

SB 1375, which allows certified nurse-practitioners to perform some early-term abortions

**SCA** (Senate Constitutional Amendment) 10, introduced in the Senate as a measure to place a constitutional amendment on the November ballot to enshrine in the California constitution the right to an abortion and to contraception. When this measure passed in the Senate, it became **Proposition 1**.
