In support of Women's History month, we heard from <u>Kate Zernike</u>, a Pulitzer Prize winning journalist and author of <u>The Exceptions: Nancy Hopkins. MIT. and the Fight for Women in Science.</u> Kate broke the story of the sixteen female scientists who forced MIT to publicly admit it had discriminated against its female faculty for years. This action sparked a nationwide reckoning with the pervasive sexism in science.

# **Membership Update**

At our April branch luncheon/business meeting, we will vote on raising branch dues from \$16 to \$25 (effective 2024-2025 membership year). Branch dues have not been raised for at least 18 years and, most likely, even longer than that. Our branch dues are currently one of the lowest in the state. National dues are planned to increase for the 2023-2024 year.

In April, you should expect to receive membership renewal notices from AAUW.org for national, state and branch renewals. **This is the year to convert to online membership renewal!!** Per our AAUW state president, our goal is to have 90% of our members renew online. Detailed instructions will be included, and, as always, I am available to help you if needed. The issues we dealt with last year have been corrected, and you should find it easy to set up an account online and renew your membership.

We are recruiting new branch members and are holding a monthly "Get to Know Us" hour. If you know someone who shares AAUW's goals and mission and/or who would enjoy some of our many branch interest groups, please send their names to my attention.

**National membership dues** will increase \$5 to \$67 for 2022-2023, of which \$64 will be tax-deductible. California state dues will remain the same at \$20, and branch dues at \$16, neither which are tax deductible.

**Membership Renewals** will be sent from National via email in the coming months. I encourage you to take advantage of renewing via the *automated online system*. One, it is so easy! Two, there is no paperwork. Last year, the majority of our branch members renewed online.

# Making space for women of color in architecture

Less than ½ of 1 percent of licensed architects in the U.S. are Black women. Pascale Sablan overcame the structural and interpersonal biases latent in architectural school to be among this group. She is working to expand the Great Diverse Designers Library, among other steps, to ensure a more diverse generation of architects that shape the building environment of the future. Here's her story.

# AAUW California State Public Policy Committee Sets 2023-24 Legislative Agenda

AAUW California Public Policy Committee sets policy directives that serve our mission and inform our state <u>legislative priorities</u>. Every two years this committee gets feedback from AAUW members across our state when choosing legislative bills that align with our mission: to advance gender equity for women and girls through research, education, and advocacy.

Our public policy advocate Kathy Von Osten will spend most of her time working on three legislative bills that align with our mission. Our advocate will work with the bill authors' offices, attend committing hearings, and write letters of support for these priority bills.

Here are AAUW California's top three state legislative bills to support:

**AB1394** – This is our co-sponsored bill. It would allow victims of child sexual exploitation and trafficking to sue a social media platform for between \$1 million and \$5 million if the victim can prove the platform design knowingly, recklessly or negligently facilitated the use of code words for sexual predators to describe the type of child and the type of sexual activity that resulted in the act of exploitation.

**SB287** - This bill would prohibit a social media platform from using a design, algorithm, or feature that the platform knows, or should know, causes child users to: purchase fentanyl; inflict harm on themselves or others; develop an eating disorder or engage in dangerous dieting; purposely take their own lives; and/or experience addiction to the social media platform. A victim of any of these consequences can sue the platform for up to \$250,000 for each violation.

**AB549** - This bill requires all state agencies to conduct an evaluation of all of their departments to ensure the state does not discriminate against women, and report their findings every two years.
