Our **2023 Tribute to Excellence** award recipient **Brooke Bistline** is an accomplished woman with a unique profile for anyone of her age! Come to our AAUW-LPD branch **Meet and Greet** on **Friday June 9th** from 4:00-6:00 pm. Meet Brooke and you'll understand why.

To quote Brooke: "It was 2011, just a year after the devastating earthquake that tore apart the country (Haiti), crumbling homes and killing hundreds of thousands..... I stood with my shovel, looking over the newly planted orchard and vegetable garden in the center of the orphanage courtyard I saw the children being treated for cuts, old wounds, and skin

conditions that could have so easily been prevented with basic first-aid knowledge and sanitation instruction. I saw a need, and in that moment, I saw my future."

Brooke returned home to learn the emergency response skills she now uses as a 911 Alameda County Paramedic. She continued to feel a further call to serve, however. Brooke discovered <u>Samaritan's Purse</u>, a non-profit humanitarian organization that helps victims of war, poverty, natural disasters, disease, and famine. Last year, Brooke applied for a position on a Samaritan's Purse disaster response team. Brooke trained for deployment to Ukraine, where she helped build and run a field hospital approximately 10 miles from the active fighting. Brooke worked 14 hours daily for 6 weeks (close to 600 hours of service!) as a Paramedic. Her team treated civilian patients injured or ill due to direct effects of the war, as well as military personnel.

Inspired by the doctors and nurses she worked alongside in Ukraine, Brooke has returned to the East Bay to continue her job as a Paramedic while she works toward education completion of her Biology degree and subsequent medical school. During summers between her school courses, Brooke plans to continue learning while on future medical team service deployments.

Congratulations Brooke on your continued education and service!




Thank you to new branch member <u>Heema Sinibaldi</u> for participating in this Spring's **AAUW California Lobby Days!** Heema's 26-year profile as a Professional World Language Educator includes: Graduate Student Instructor (University of Michigan), Visiting Lecturer (Eastern Michigan University), French instructor (Cabrillo Community, Monterey Peninsula high schools), Department Chair of World Languages (Livermore High School), affiliate liaison to the California Language Teachers Association, and Professional Development Workshops completed (Stanford University, UC Berkeley).

From Heema: "I met virtually with fellow AAUW members from the Napa Chapter. We presented three bills via Zoom to Senator Bill Dodd's office. I also participated in the much larger virtual training on the weekend prior. It was an excellent experience! I definitely plan on being a repeat participant."

The reception of AAUW California's Public Policy Committee's top three bills advocated this year (AB 1394, SB 287, and AB 549) was generally favorable, especially the two social media bills. Legislators and their staff alike were concerned with the pervasive problem of children being targeted by social media. AB 549 was more difficult to explain, including CEDAW (Convention on the Elimination of all Forms of Discrimination Against Women).

Per Ginny Hatfield, Amy Hom, and Kathi Harper (AUW California Public Policy Committee): A sterling endorsement came from none other than Alf Brandt, Policy Consultant for Assembly Speaker Anthony Rendon, whose mother was an AAUW member in the 1940's in Orange County. He credits her involvement in AAUW "making me the man I am today."

AAUW's 2023 National Election

Voter turnout was nearly double that of last year. Results of the 2023 election:

- Kimberly S. Adams, Edwina Frances Martin, Jenna Kirkpatrick Howard and Mary Zupanc were elected to serve on the AAUW National Board of Directors.
- Our Leadership
- The bylaws revision was approved by 95.1% of voters.
- The Public Policy Priority revision was approved by 96.3% of voters.



Since 1998, AAUW has helped change girls' lives through **Tech Trek**, a experiential summer camp designed to raise the interest of 8th grade girls in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM). Our LPD AAUW Branch supports this program. Seventh grade Math/Science teachers from each local middle school can nominate 2-3 girls for the annual program. Nominated girls fill out a questionnaire, write an essay and then interview with our Tech Trek committee. Through your

continued financial support, we are able to send 9 girls to camp this summer. UC Davis and Sonoma State are the on-site camps this summer.

The Tech Trek committee hopes you will enjoy hearing from these girls at the September Tea.

- Enter your email address, then click "Reset Your Password" to receive your login email. If you don't receive an email within 20 minutes, please contact connect@aauw.org.
- After you receive the email, enter your email address and then "Create and Confirm your Password" to access your Personal Snapshot.
- **Most important:** <u>Join our branch</u>, Livermore-Pleasanton-Dublin (CA0048). Scroll down to find our branch name.
- Continue to scroll down to the payment screen.
- You will receive a receipt when finished.

Board members have renewed online. If you need assistance, you can also ask one of them for help.

For those who cannot renew online, we will accept checks. They should be made out to AAUW-LPD and mailed to AAUW-LPD, P.O. Box 661, Livermore, CA 94551. If there have been any changes to your contact information, please include those changes.

Las Positas College hosted its 11th annual <u>Honoring Women Veterans program</u> this Spring. The *Her Story* theme brought stories of three female veterans to the public. The panelists were asked, "What should be mandatory for veterans transitioning to college?" Their answers? Free daycare, a mentor to be assigned to each veteran, and access to a good veterans' center like the one at Las Positas College.

Quilts of Honor were awarded to: Tracy Walker (Navy veteran/LPC alumnus), Tina Knutson (Army veteran), Julia Coty (Air Force veteran/ LPC Alumnus), and Dr Jannett Jackson (Army veteran/past Chancellor of Chabot-Las Positas College District).



(From Gloria L. Blackwood, AAUW CEO) "Building power for women is key. On April 27, the <u>Equal Rights Amendment</u> fell short in the Senate vote—but we are not defeated—and we applaud the Senate's decision to recommit the resolution and revisit it in the future."

AAUW Survey: NYC Women and the Pandemic

In August 2021, AAUW contracted with the public opinion research firm <u>lpsos</u> to poll women in New York City about how they fared economically during the pandemic. Women—including many women earning middle-class incomes—report that they were in a financially precarious position well before the pandemic pushed them over the edge.

Reasons why black women are set to become major wealth creators in 2023

New research from the Pew Research Center (a nationally representative survey of 5,152 U.S. adults): 1 in 4 Black wives out-earn their husbands. This study, which sparks a drastic change in gender norms, comes 50 years after men were considered the sole breadwinners in 85% of opposite-sex marriages.
