#### **Tech Trek Fundraiser**

On Saturday, February 3, 4 to 6 PM, we will again be gathering at the Karlsen home for an afternoon of fun and socializing to recognize 25 years of supporting Tech Trek. Please bring your beverage of choice and an appetizer to share, and don't forget your checkbook. This gathering will allow you to make a difference in a young girl's life through your donation to Tech Trek.

As many of you know, our branch has been part of Tech Trek since the very beginning--25 years ago. A lot has changed over that time! Each year, our branch sends nine or ten girls for an unforgettable adventure. Twenty-five years ago, the cost was \$500 per girl. Now is it \$1200 for the full camp. This year, estimated costs are as follows:

- \$50 pays for a field trip for one girl
- \$100 provides for a ½ day at camp
- \$200 provides for a full day at camp
- \$600 covers half of a scholarship
- \$1200 awards a full scholarship

# **Lobby Days 2024**

AAUW California's Lobby Days will be held on April 2 and 3, 2024. All members are encouraged to participate in this act of advocacy that is essential for achievement of the organization's legislative priorities. In addition to members, college students will be invited to join the event. Their participation will help with reaching more legislative offices, and this introduction to the organization will inspire these advocacy-minded young people to join AAUW.

A hybrid event is planned this year with meetings scheduled virtually over Zoom as well as in person at the Capitol. Members who live in and around Sacramento will have the option to participate in person. Legislative offices are willing to meet virtually or in person, and the virtual option makes it easier for AAUW members around the state to participate.

Training materials on the bills and the event will be posted on the state website in mid-March, and a mandatory training webinar will be held on March 25.

Lobby Days provide a wonderful opportunity to meet with your legislators and advocate for legislation to promote gender equity and improve the lives of women and girls.

# **AAUW Earns Four-Star Rating from Charity Navigator**

We are thrilled to share a momentous achievement with you – AAUW has been awarded a four-star rating by <u>Charity Navigator!</u> This recognition is a testament to AAUW's commitment to core nonprofit principles such as fiscal responsibility, adherence to ethical practices, and having tangible mission impact.

As we celebrate this accomplishment, we want to express our deepest gratitude to you, our members, as it is your continued dedication and support that makes an accolade like this possible.







### **AAUW FUND**

As we close out the year for the AAUW Fund and await publication of the latest fellowship/scholarship recipients, our members may enjoy reading some research on Artificial Intelligence (AI) and healthcare. This was a discussion group topic several months ago, and one that captured our imaginations (over coffee and breakfast in Pleasanton).

We noted that Harvard education is promoting an "AI for Beginners" tutorial to healthcare professionals, while the esteemed PEW Research Center is providing survey results stating "60% of Americans Would Be Uncomfortable With Provider Relying on AI in Their Own Health Care." Until a patient's belief system and AI acceptance more closely align, there is an opportunity for discomfort in the examining room — that exceeds the gap in the gown.

Harvard touts the robust, complex imaging skill of AI which promotes diagnosis; the AI trait for analyzing massive data sets of patient characteristics in providing precision medicine; and utilization of predictive modeling to calculate potential outcomes. This all sounds like very good stuff. Yet 6 in 10 U.S. adults say they would feel uncomfortable if their doctor relied on AI for diagnosis and treatment. How about you?

Please take a view of the research at the link below. It's truly a fascinating paper and one that may make you reconsider your current position. There is no question that AI is here and growing, and it is important for us to understand the basics, where it is headed, and how we evolve our thinking. This research helped close the gap for me and I hope you enjoy it too.
