Local Scholarship Foundation Update



FROM AROUND THE COMMUNITY

Community Organizations Combat Moms for Liberty

On Saturday, April 13, seventeen community groups from Bay Area school districts came together to strategize against the extreme right-wing group known as Moms for Liberty, (M4L). The Lift Up Public Schools Summit was held at Rossmoor Walnut Creek, hosted by the American Association of University Women and Democrats of Rossmoor. Representatives of LC4PE attended the 3-hour session.

Keynote speaker Liz Mikitarian, founder of the national organization STOP Moms for Liberty, explained the origin and tactics of M4L. Established in Florida by two extremely conservative women with MAGA Republican Party ties, M4L has achieved a meteoric rise to national status with chapters across the country, including in Alameda and Contra Costa Counties. M4L's tactics favor disrupting local school board meetings with demands for book banning and various anti-LGBTQ+ board policies. STOP M4L was organized to expose and combat the M4L agenda and to defeat board candidates sponsored by M4L. The true agenda of M4L, as stated by Mikitarian, is "not about book banning, not about parents' rights, ... but it's really about destroying confidence in public schools." Their ultimate goal is to privatize our public education system.

The summit was a fruitful opportunity for local organizations to network, exchange ideas, and unify and strengthen the opposition to M4L. For more information email info@LiftUpPublicSchools.com or visit the website at www.LiftUpPublicSchools.com.

Approximately 41 percent of banned works feature LGBTQ themes, main characters, or significant supporting characters. Characters of color make up 40 percent of the main or significant secondary characters, while 21 percent of the titles deal with racial and racist topics.
